It's baseball season, which is supposed to mean the weather is warmer with more sunny days, but here in Northeast Ohio we know that isn't always true. For the past 18 years, for me, this time of year signals more extended time with young people, since I help coach baseball at the high school level. Most of our YFC meetings with young people are weekly and last less than 2 hours. During that time, we are wearing many hats and making sure things go well. We make sure teens feel welcome, that all adult leaders have info, that food is hot and ready, and that no arguments break out with the large number of teens together, but coaching is different!

As a coach I have many responsibilities....communicate with players and parents, make sure all equipment and the field is ready, make a line up and make game decisions, but I also have a lot of time to just listen. We are with the team 6 days a week for at least 3 hours per day and double that on Saturday usually. Bus rides, locker room, weight room, and the dugout are places where students are talking with one another and often asking for my opinion on a particular issue. I am in their circle, and I get to hear about their lives. It really is daunting to hear the things high school students are dealing with. We have 24 young men on the JV and Varsity baseball team and here are some of their issues that we have talked about.

Two senior young men don't live at home but live with their girlfriends and are having struggles with their relationships. One even disappeared for 5 days and did not contact us.

One young man lives with his grandparents because his parents are addicted to drugs and alcohol.

One player's mom left his dad and moved in with her girlfriend.

One player has never had a parent come watch him play.

Three players have parents who are currently going through divorce proceedings. One mom is recovering from breast cancer.

Two brothers have a very rough home life as their grandma explained it all to me during a rain delay.

In the dugout and locker room, I also get a glimpse into their world, their language, and their jokes. I am often interjecting a quick reminder about proper language and talk, but it also helps me to understand them a little better. After all, I am in their world. Unfortunately, young people aren't always able to leave their troubles behind and these troubles often follow them to the ball field. The insights I gain by listening have helped me understand a little better when someone is having a bad day.

During the course of the season, I take players out 2 at a time for a sit-down dinner. I talk more in depth with them, even asking about their relationship with God. Parents sign a permission slip ahead of time where I explain that I will talk about my faith during dinner, and I have never had a parent not let their son go. When we listen, it gives us a window into who these young people are and when we sit down they are able to hear about the God who loves them just as they are. Thank you for your support that makes this possible.
