I love hanging out with teens and hearing their stories and discovering what makes each of them unique. At our Garage nights and cafe nights and teen parents support group nights, our mentors have many opportunities to connect with young people. As conversations unfold, we learn about their families, their interests, their fears and struggles, their strengths and goals, and how they are doing in school. As we build these relationships and build trust, we are able to engage in meaningful conversations about where these teens are with their thoughts on God and faith.

Another way we connect with teens on an even deeper level occurs when we take one or two out for a meal or kayaking, etc. Often, the prize for a game is that the winning kid(s) get to pick a leader to take them for dinner. This inherently creates extra opportunities for discussion.

I was blessed to be picked by 2 gals that won a Thursday night game in the spring. We finally found a day last week that worked for both of them and the 3 of us headed to lunch. Neither had any idea what they were hungry for, so I gave them several options. They picked the small 50's diner that I mentioned. The fun and quaint atmosphere was perfect for conversa-

tion. It was super cool to hear the gal who is now a senior talk about how her experiences at the Garage helped her see God as a God who cares about her and a God that she can trust. It was amazing to hear her talk about ways she had been sharing her faith with peers and to hear her excitement about wanting to get baptized soon. This gal was a middle schooler when we first met, wise beyond her years and broken from some horrible things that had happened to her. At that time, she questioned if she even believed in God anymore because the stuff done to her was done by someone claiming to be a man of God. She was clumping together her experiences, this man and God. We had many opportunities over the years to help her 'unclump', to help her discover who God really is and to help her see who she, herself, really is ...a daughter of the king who is NOT defined by what has been done to her.

The brightness in her eyes and the energy in her soul as she spoke about her faith to the other young gal at lunch brought tears to my eyes. The other gal is a freshman and was definitely tuned in to what she was hearing from her friend, but not real vocal on exactly where she stands on her faith...yet.

All glory to God that we have this local ministry to reach out to teens where they are in life and to help them get to new and healthier spaces with their faith and life. Thank you to all who make this outreach a possibility!



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
